Talk: What if we hope?

Revolving around the central theme of Hope, the opening discussion will dissect a broad range of issues.

We'll explore the underlying political tensions, prejudice and misunderstandings that prevail across our region, and the experiences of individuals and groups that seek to provide a grounded social vision that shows hope was — and can still be — part of the relationship among our societies. We'll delve into the continuing global rise and consolidation of far right politics which threatens to become a normalized fascism, and ask what kind of a left could address the inequalities that have become rooted in neoliberal systems. We'll examine how an intersectional feminist discourse and activism is taking shape at local and global levels, and how this has impacted feminist activism in Kosovo. And we'll analyze how class affects what people think they should or can be hopeful about, and how the pandemic may impact the way we tackle societal inequalities. Above all, we'll start to question: What if we hope?



If you watch her videos, read her books and interviews, it is easy to see that Mona is fierce, unapologetic, and demanding in her efforts to question and challenge the very roots of patriarchy. Fighting multiple layers of oppression, aiming for true intersectionality and absolutely not settling for anything less than full equality and justice, Mona is someone that by sharing her journey inspires, elevates and teaches.

Her work presents us with a new feminist movement that is merged within journalism and commentary and that ultimately knows how to fight the "tentacles of the patriarchy" as she puts it in her interview with Sarah Malik at SBS.

Through this Volume UP program we want to provoke a discussion that merges and clashes the global and the local around contemporary media, feminism and activism. In this talk and masterclass Mona will share with us how the world can become a more hopeful place through mobilization, articulation and most importantly the perseverance to inspire, mobilize and transfer skills.

Talk: The left as a necessity toward equity and social justice

Regardless of the ideological leanings of the parties in power, grassroots leftist groups have always questioned and if necessary opposed the party in power throughout history. Unapologetic and demanding, movements that rose as a necessity to either stop or push forward policies and mechanisms have often reminded governments that they are not unaccountable.

Societies have witnessed many changes throughout history, when it comes to the parties that are voted in, ideologies that are supported, groups that are privileged and discriminated against. But one thing has remained consistent — the capability of groups within those societies and political systems to mobilize for various causes. In different shapes and forms, these movements have started small and have become big in articulating different communities' needs and have often led to landmark decisions and changes that perhaps governments would not otherwise make.

The leftist groups outside the parliament are often considered to be the door where the marginalized seek refuge and the discriminated against seek protection. Although often starting from the outside, many movements that started small — have gone inside the parliament seeking change from within, transforming into political parties themselves.

However, does this mean that consistent and long lasting change from the outside is impossible? With the streets full of protesters and global movements, what kind of mobilizations have we been seeing? What issues have been put forth? What impact have they had, and how do we understand impact? Is the left necessary to move toward equity and social justice? These are just some of the questions we will seek to answer during the regional discussion.

Dobrica Veselinovic is a lifelong activist, political innovator and grassroots organizer. He graduated from the Faculty of Political Sciences at the University of Belgrade. For the past ten years he was active in the civil society sector, working for various NGOs and starting projects related to urban development and education.

Since 2010, he has fought for public spaces and the greater participation of citizens in decision-making processes. Veselinovic is one of founders of the Ministry of Space Collective and the Institute for Urban Policy, and one of leaders of the citizen movement "Don't Let Belgrade D (r) own." He is also one of founders of the new political network Civic Front, a network of grassroots initiatives and organizations from more than 10 cities in Serbia.

Veselinovic is a former German Marshall Memorial Fellow, and part of the European Young Leaders class of 2020.



SVIBOR JANČIĆ

Advocate for transparent and efficient local self-government based in Zagreb, Croatia

Svibor Jančić is one of founders of the "Za grad" political party that was created by a number of young political and ecological activists who decided to step up from civil society into the political arena. During the local elections in 2013, he was elected as a representative for the City District Council Maksimir, City of Zagreb where he made a notable effort to protect a public recreational zone called Svetice.

In the 2017 local elections, Za grad entered a wide coalition of Green Left parties including "Zagreb je Naš!"; "Nova ljevica," "OraH" and "Radnička fronta," assembled around Zagreb Mayoral candidate Tomislav Tomašević, and won four representative places in the City Assembly, City of Zagreb and Svibor represents one seat. He is recognized as an advocate for transparent and efficient local self-government and safe and better traffic infrastructure with an emphasis on public transportation and cycling infrastructure.

At only 29, Barnyard inspired a fresh wave of feminists in the UK by mobilizing young women and providing resources to existing and new feminist organizations and activist groups. Kat and UK Feminista have used several social media campaigns and have been present in local and national media as a means of promoting gender equality in schools.

As we witness the deeply rooted sexism in Kosovo and the world and parallel to this, also the rise of movements, collectives and inspiring individuals who choose not to stay silent — with Kat we want to explore ways through which we can change this for good.

How do we channel the drive to claim an active role in what is surrounding us and how we use the tools at our disposal to demand equity and social justice — these are just a few of the questions we aim at dissecting with Kat Baynard.

Join this public talk, followed by a closed masterclass, if you have the ideas but need guidance in using the tools to support and organize your feminist initiatives. If you are thinking of starting your initiative and need a push — this might be just the right edition for you. In 2010 Kat was named in the *Guardian* newspaper as "the most influential young feminist in the country", and in 2012 a Guardian interviewer wrote: "At only 29, she has pulled off what to me at her age had looked impossible, inspiring a fresh wave of feminists".

Talk: The truth — through the eyes and words of photojournalists

The importance of photojournalism is often overlooked when compared to text-based journalism. As journalism is evolving into a more visual experience for the readers, we can undoubtedly say that captivating stories and truths are often conveyed through the lens of cameras. Understanding the central role of photojournalism, we have organized a discussion with photojournalists who have bravely documented experiences from the most difficult contexts.

In an effort to recognize this essential aspect of producing journalism, where we also tackle the challenges of being a photojournalist, we have brought together photographers that have documented areas of conflict and brought to the eyes of the world truths that were often veiled.

For this discussion, we have invited famed photographers who have covered wars, genocide and the most horrific stories of our time. At a time when facts and truths are constantly challenged and questioned; while certain leaders seek to own the narratives around conflicts, wars, political developments or seek to promote a certain narrative as being the only valid one — photography brings evidence and documentation that speaks to the public at another level.

We have brought this particular composition of photographers together to provoke a larger discussion on transitional justice, documentation and reconciliation. It is rare that photographers are provided the space to tell in their own words their own truths and experiences. This is exactly what makes this discussion unique and useful in understanding how our collective memory is shaped and how our truths are built.

We bring distinctive perspectives and experiences of the past from these photojournalists, and we look forward to how the future will look both for photography and the areas they tackled throughout their work.

After the screening of the discussion, a special Q&A with Veton Nurkollari and Ferdi Limani will take place at Kino Armata.

Veton is a member of the advisory board of the Balkan Documentary Center and is also a member of the selection committee of Cinema Eye Honors, an organization that recognizes and honors exemplary craft in non-fiction filmmaking.

He is a founding board member of The Albanian Cinema Project, and is also a member of the European Cultural Parliament and European Film Academy.

Gary is an award-winning photographer and a co-founder and director of the VII Photo Agency. He is also the co-director of the VII Foundation and director and founder of the VII Academy. Gary is a member of the board of trustees of the Frontline Club, London; co-founder of The GroundTruth Project, Boston; founding director of the Program for Narrative & Documentary Practice at the Institute for Global Leadership at Tufts University; twice chair and president of the World Press Photo Award; was a Nieman Fellow at Harvard University in 2009; and a Logan Non-Fiction Fellow at the Carey Institute in 2017.

He was a contract photographer for Newsweek in the 1990s and 2000s. Gary has worked as a photographer all over the world since the late 1980s, early in his career in conflict photography, and more recently with an increased focus on anthropology and socioeconomics.

After a further five years in New York, he now lives in London with his wife and two children. His work has won many awards including three World Press Photo Awards.

In the late '90s when his birthplace was in the middle of atrocities, Ferdi realized the importance of documenting history. After his journalism studies he began working for daily newspapers in Kosovo and collaborated with news agencies like AP, Cosmos and Sipa.

A high point in his career was when he was commissioned by the government of Kosovo to document the independence declaration. Since 2008 he has lived in France and was based in Istanbul. He continues to produce work for various French and international media in Europe, Middle East and the Balkans.

Indian scholar, environmental activist

Vandana Shiva lines up with us to talk about sustainable food movement. Considered as a modern day revolutionary, Vandana is an Indian scholar, environmental activist who has dedicated nearly five decades of her life to the protection of biodiversity.

Shiva did her MSc Hons in Particle physics at Panjab University in Chandigarh in 1973. In 1979, she completed and received her PhD in the Foundations of Quantum Theory on the topic "Non locality and Hidden Variable in Quantum Theory" at the University of Western Ontario. Since 1984 she has dedicated herself to promote non violent farming based on Biodiversity. In 1991 she found red Navdanya. Her work has shown how through conservation of Biodiversity, humans can produce more food, better health, and reduce hunger, disease and poverty.

She is currently based in Delhi and Dehra Dun, her hometown where she established the Earth University and A Biodiversity Conservation farm. She has authored more than twenty books. She is one of the leaders and board members of the International Forum on Globalization, and a figure of the global solidarity movement which she refers to as the Earth Democracy movement.

She received the Right Livelihood Award in 1993, the Midori prize on Biodiversity and numerous other awards for her service to the Earth, the protection of Biodiversity, and people's rights.

Ibrahim Nehme is a creator, curator, and speaker based in Beirut. His work is a cross-pollination between journalism, activism, and artistic expression. He is interested in producing and disseminating media that helps in raising the frequency of the collective consciousness. In 2012, he founded The Outpost magazine with the intention of imagining a new narrative on and from the Arab region.

Sub-titled as "a magazine of possibilities", The Outpost was highly commended and recognized around the world. The Guardian called it "a successor to the Economist" and wrote that it is "a reminder of the power of the imagination to shift perspectives." It won the Choice Award at the Stack Awards 2015 and Magazine of the Year at the Magpile Awards in 2014.

The Outpost stopped publishing its printed edition in 2016 and Ibrahim spent the next three years researching the relationship between cultural output and social impact. This research subsequently led to the birth of Radio Mansion in Beirut and The Outpost café in Amman.

During this time, he also helped conceive of 'a Dance Mag', a magazine about dance in all its forms and flows, and organized workshops in creative writing, futurecasting, and podcasting. He is currently working on uploading The Outpost's entire printed archive to an online platform, as well as developing a new media project, which brings together elements of creative thinking, community building, and live performance.

Award-winning journalist, emerita professor at the Missouri School of Journalism, faculty fellow at Poynter Institute and editor of Nieman Storyboard. Jacqui Banaszynski joins for our talks as an Award-winning journalist and an emerita professor at the Missouri School of Journalism and faculty fellow at the world-renowned Poynter Institute. She serves as editor of Nieman Storyboard, a global website which celebrates and examines the art and craft of narrative journalism.

Banaszynski's newspaper career took her to all seven continents, including three trips to Antarctica. She has written about corruption and crime, beauty pageants and popes, AIDS and the Olympics, dogsled expeditions and refugee camps, labor strikes and political strife, traffic fatalities and family tragedies. While at the St. Paul Pioneer Press, her series "AIDS in the Heartland" won the 1988 Pulitzer Prize in feature writing.

She was a finalist for the 1986 Pulitzer in international reporting for coverage of the Ethiopian famine and won the nation's top deadline sports reporting award for coverage of the 1988 Olympics. Banaszynski has edited numerous award-winning projects, including projects that won ASNE Best Writing, Ernie Pyle Human Interest Writing and national business and investigative prizes.

In 2008, she was named to the Association of Sunday and Features Editors Features Hall of Fame. She now coaches reporters, writers and storytellers in newsrooms and at workshops around the world.

Award-winning British-Turkish novelist and the most widely read female author in Turkey Elif Shafak is an award-winning British-Turkish novelist and the most widely read female author in Turkey. She writes in both Turkish and English, and has published seventeen books, eleven of which are novels. Her work has been translated into 50 languages. Her latest novel 10 Minutes 38 Seconds in this Strange World was shortlisted for the Booker Prize and RSL Ondaatje Prize and chosen Blackwell's Book of the Year. Her previous novel, The Forty Rules of Love was chosen by BBC among 100 Novels that Shaped Our World. Shafak holds a PhD in political science and she has taught at various universities in Turkey, the US and the UK, including St Anne's College, Oxford University, where she is an honorary fellow.

She is a member of Weforum Global Agenda Council on Creative Economy and a founding member of ECFR (European Council on Foreign Relations). An advocate for women's rights, LGBT rights and freedom of speech, Shafak is an inspiring public speaker and twice TED Global speaker, each time receiving a standing ovation. Shafak contributes to major publications around the world and she was awarded the medal of Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres and is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature. In 2017 she was chosen by Politico as one of the twelve people "who will give you a much needed lift of the heart".
